# SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

**The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue racing is hers alone.  
(RRS Fundamental Rule 4)**

## 1 RULES

- 1.1 The regatta will be governed by the rules as defined in The Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS).
- 1.2 Appendix WP of The Rules of Sailing.
- 1.3 RRS part 2 rules will be replaced with the right-of-way rules of the International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea (IRPCAS) between the times of local sunset and sunrise; or government right-of-way rules if applicable. A scoring penalty (RRS 44.3) will be applicable during these times.

- 1.5 World Sailing Offshore Special Regulations Category 3 with Category 2 liferafts, AIS Transponder and RORC Prescriptions.
- 1.6 The rules and regulations of appropriate Class rules; IRC Rules Parts A, B & C, Class40 and MOCRA Rules.
- 1.7 RRS 28.2 is amended to include: (d) pass between the marks or waypoints of a gate, pass or cross a line of latitude or longitude, as described in the course, from the direction of the previous mark.
- 1.8 If there is a conflict between languages the English text will take precedence.

## 2 EQUIPMENT AND MEASUREMENT CHECKS

- 2.1 A yacht or equipment may be inspected at any time for compliance with the Rules and Sailing Instructions.

## 3 NOTICES TO COMPETITORS

- 3.1 Notices to competitors will be posted on the Official Notice Board located in the window of the RORC Race Office Cowes. Notices may be displayed on the documents page of the RORC website at <http://www.rorc.org/racing/race-documents>

## 4 NOTICE TO MARINERS

- 4.1 Competitors are reminded of their responsibility to take account of Notice to Mariners and should be particularly aware of:
- 4.2 **Southampton Precautionary Area (Thorn Channel)**  
Competitors are reminded to maintain a constant watch for shipping movements, particularly in the Port of Southampton Precautionary Area (Thorn Channel). Your attention is drawn to the ABP Notice to Mariners No.14 2019 which covers the movement of shipping and the likely vessel tracks. ## 5 AIS

- 5.1 **All boats are required to have their AIS transceivers switched on and able to transmit (at least every minute) and receiving from 0700 on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> May and throughout the race.**
- 5.2 A boat's AIS must transmit: the boat's MMSI number, current racing name.
- 5.3 Nothing shall be done to inhibit AIS transmissions
- 5.4 Boats unable to meet these requirements shall submit comprehensive details of the reason on their Declaration Form and may be subject to protest. The penalty for breaking this rule is at the discretion of the Protest Committee and may **include disqualification.**

## 7 NUMBER OF PERSONS ABOARD

- 7.1 **After leaving the dock to race but not before 0630 BST and before starting, each boat shall send an SMS (text) message to: +44 (0) 7797 805 885 using their declared “on-board” mobile number. The SMS (text) message shall contain the boat name, sail number and the number of persons on board.**
- 7.2 If the number of persons on board is less than that declared on Sailgate (<https://rorc.sailgate.com>) then the full name(s) of the persons not on board shall also be included in the SMS message.
- 7.3 A boat shall not sail with a crew member whose Emergency Contact details have not been lodged on Sailgate before the start of the race.
- 7.4 **Warning:** Boats which do not correctly SMS (text) crew numbers and any person(s) not on board are liable to disqualification.

## 8 COMMUNICATIONS

- 8.1 The Race Committee may broadcast information on VHF Ch.72, Call sign “Ocean One”.
- 8.2 **Boats are reminded of their legal obligation to keep a continuous watch on VHF Ch.16.**
- 8.3 Boats are required to have their onboard mobile phone switched on at all times.
- 8.4 Inter-boat communication calls should when possible be on DSC or, VHF Ch.16 as a calling channel and VHF Ch.72 as a working channel.
- 8.5 Boats with communications in addition to VHF should act as a link, taking other boats’ reports on VHF and passing them to the Race Committee or Coastguard.

## 9 IDENTITY GATE

- 9.1 **Before starting every yacht shall pass through an identity gate and receive acknowledgement from the Race Committee. Each boat shall have her engine running. On her port side lifelines, she shall display her sail numbers and letters. In addition a combined harness and lifejacket together with a safety line shall be worn by each member of the crew (in accordance with Special Regulations 5.01 and 5.02 and the RORC Prescriptions).**

- 9.2 There will be two identity gates; every yacht shall pass through only ONE of the gates as detailed below before starting. The gates will be available from 0630 until the last start, or longer at the discretion of the Race Committee.

**North Gate** - An identity gate will be established between Hamblewinterseries.com (4J - yellow buoy with “X” top mark) in approximate position 50°48’.63N 001°16’.65W and a gate boat displaying a blue flag with a white Seahorse and Crown and white border over a yellow flag lying to the East of Hamblewinterseries.com.

A yacht using the North Gate shall pass once through the gate from North to South.

**South Gate** - An identity gate will be established between Cowes Corinthian Buoy (34 - yellow buoy with “X” top mark) in approximate position 50°46’.15N 001°17’.20W and a gate boat displaying a blue flag with a white seahorse and crown and white border over a yellow flag lying to the south of Cowes Corinthian Buoy.

A yacht using the South Gate shall pass once through the gate from East to West.

- 9.3 **Warning:** Yachts which do not pass through a gate correctly are liable to disqualification.
- 9.4 **After the start** when sail numbers are not displayed elsewhere (sails down) they shall be displayed secured to the lifelines on the port quarter.

## 10 STARTING TIMES AND SIGNALS

10.1 The race will be started by using RRS 26, with the warning signal being made 10 minutes before the starting signal.

## 11 THE STARTING LINE

11.1 The starting line is formed by bringing the Royal Yacht Squadron's flagstaff into line with the white line on the orange diamond on the Castle. (As an aid to competitors vertical light beams are installed at the RYS to identify the starting line transit. The intensity of the light beam increases as you approach the line but the lights are momentarily obscured by the forward mast when you are on the line. The lights are navigational aids only and do not constitute the starting line. Any failure of this equipment shall be disregarded.)

**Outer limit:** (which is not on the starting line) Williams Shipping Buoy; leave to starboard.

**Inner limit:** (which is not on the starting line) red/orange inflatable buoy up to 0.1nm from the RYS flagstaff; leave to port.

11.2 The start will be to the West

## 12 LATE AT THE START

12.1 If a boat which has not previously come to the starting area, is not off her moorings at her preparatory signal and comes to the starting area under power or being towed, she shall stop her engine (or drop the tow) and complete a Two-Turns penalty as specified in RRS 44.2 before starting. This changes RRS 44.1.

12.2 No penalty will be imposed for an infringement of RRS 42 for complying with SI 12.1. This changes RRS 42 and 45.

## 13 AREAS THAT ARE OBSTRUCTIONS

13.1 A yacht shall not enter an area designated as an Obstruction. Obstructions are listed in Appendix One

13.2 Additionally racing boats shall not:

13.2.1 Anchor or kedge in the cable and pipeline area between Stone Point and Gurnard Bay. This area is shown on Admiralty Chart 2036 and is between the line from Stansore Point to Egypt Point and the line from Inchmery House Lepe to Thorness Bay.

13.2.2 Pass to the north of the beacon marking the obstruction of iron piles (Sowley Boom) to the East of Lymington near Durns Point.

## 14 THE COURSE

14.1 The course is detailed in Appendix One.

## 15 REPORTING

15.1 In the event the Race Committee asks a boat to report (ie AIS failure), reporting should be done by SMS (+44 (0)7797 805 885), email (racing@rorc.org) or any other means possible. Reports shall include:

- Name of boat and Sail Number
- Date/time (BST)/position
- Course and Speed over the Ground
- Names of any Boats nearby

## 16 USE OF ENGINE

16.1 When a yacht uses its engine, e.g. to avoid collision or in a grave emergency, the facts shall be reported on her Declaration Form.

## 17 TEMPORARY DISCONTINUANCE OF RACING

- 17.1 If a boat makes fast in order to take shelter or in an emergency, the crew may temporarily leave the boat to handle her moorings.
- 17.2 If she uses her engine for propulsion she shall, on rejoining the race, return to the spot where she began to use her engine, turn off her engine and complete a Two-Turns penalty as specified in RRS 44.2 before continuing to race from that spot. She shall report the circumstances on her Declaration Form. This changes RRS 45 and 47.2.

## 18 TIME LIMIT

- 18.1 There is no time limit for the race.

## 19 RETIREMENTS AND NON STARTERS

- 19.1 Retirements and non-starters must promptly inform the Race Committee or the Coastguard. It is imperative that yachts that are no longer competing can be excluded from any Search & Rescue operation. **Failure to comply with this rule may lead to disqualification or exclusion from future RORC racing.**

## 20 THE FINISH

- 20.1 The finishing line runs for 0.1nm due north from North Head Buoy.
- 20.2 A committee vessel, which may be "Three Cs", a light blue hulled fishing vessel, may be on station near the end of the line. It will display a blue RORC flag with a white border and Seahorse; and a constant blue light at night.
- 20.3 All yachts are requested to call "Ocean One" on VHF Ch.72 when 15 minutes from the finish.
- 20.4 To aid with identification, when finishing at night, yachts are requested to shine a spotlight on their sail numbers and call "Ocean One" on VHF Ch.72 immediately after finishing.
- 20.5 Yachts are reminded to take their own finishing times (BST) together with the names of the yachts ahead and astern, if any. Finishing times shall be delivered to the RORC as soon as possible.

## 21 RACE FINISH DECLARATIONS

- 21.1 After finishing or retiring, every yacht is required to fully complete and submit a Declaration Form to the Race Committee as soon as possible, but **not later than 24 hours after the end of the race**. Every member of the crew shall sign the Declaration Form. Failure to comply with this rule may result in the yacht being excluded from the results. When a yacht retires from a race she shall write the reasons on her Declaration Form.
- 21.2 When after a race a yacht cannot promptly deliver the Declaration Form, she shall without delay telephone the Race Committee, confirm that she has finished racing and give her time of finishing in BST. In this case the completed Declaration Form may be scanned and emailed to [racing@rorc.org](mailto:racing@rorc.org) or faxed to +44 (0) 207 493 5252.

## 22 PENALTY SYSTEM

### 22.1 Scoring Penalty:

- 22.1.1 When the right-of-way rules of IRPCAS apply (between the hours of local sunset and sunrise) a scoring penalty applies (RRS 44.3).
- 22.1.2 The scoring penalty will be 10 minutes added to the boat's corrected time for each penalty.

### 22.2 Standard Penalties:

- 22.2.1 When at a boat's starting signal she is subject to RRS 29.1 (Individual Recall) and she fails to comply with RRS 29.1 to start correctly the Race Committee shall, without a hearing, apply a standard time penalty of 20%. This changes RRS 63.1 and A5.
- 22.2.2 For a breach of RRS 28 (Sailing the Course) where no advantage has been gained, the Race Committee shall, without a hearing, apply a standard time penalty of 20%. This changes RRS 63.1 and A5. For any other breach the penalty shall be to retire.
- 22.2.3 For a breach of any area designated an Obstruction, i.e. Traffic Separation Schemes, the Race Committee shall, without a hearing, apply a standard time penalty of 20%, unless the breach was unavoidable and unintentional and no advantage was gained. This changes RRS 63.1 and A5.
- 22.2.4 Should the Race Committee consider a standard penalty to be inappropriate, it may protest the boat.
- 22.2.5 If, in a valid hearing brought by the Race Committee under Sailing Instruction 22.2.4 or by another boat, a boat is found to have infringed RRS 28, 29.1 or Sailing Instruction 13 the penalty will be at the discretion of the Protest Committee, but will not be less than the standard penalty.

### 22.3 Grounds for Protest:

- 22.3.1 Breaches of SI 5, 9, 16 and 17 will not be grounds for protest by a boat. This changes RRS 60.1a.

### 22.4 Other Penalties

22.4.1 When the Protest Committee decides that a boat that is party to a protest hearing has broken a rule other than RRS Part 1 and 2 and that no serious damage or injury was caused and no significant advantage has been gained, it may apply a time penalty of up to 20%. Should the Protest Committee decide that the breach was minor and unintentional it may at its discretion choose to give a warning instead.

## 23 PROTESTS AND REQUESTS FOR REDRESS

- 23.1 Protests and requests for redress may be written on plain paper, but Protest forms are available at the Race Office. Protests and requests for redress or reopening shall be delivered there within the appropriate time limit.
- 23.2 The protest time limit is 3 hours after the protesting yacht finishes.

## 24 SCORING

- 24.1 The Scoring System for Offshore Races, defined in Notice of Race 1.12.1, will apply.

## 25 TROPHIES AND PRIZES

- 25.1 The following Trophies will be awarded:

Myth of Malham Cup – BCT IRC  
Loujaine Cup – IRC One  
Jamarella Trophy – IRC Two  
Maid of Malham Cup – IRC Three  
Ernest Moore Plate – IRC Four  
Ville D’Hyeres Trophy – IRC Two-Handed Class

- 25.2 Medallions:

- 25.2.1 RORC medallions will be presented as prizes for each class and division as follows:

Number of starters	6 – 8	9 – 15	16 - 24	25 or more
Prizes	2	3	4	5

- 25.2.2 When there are fewer than 6 starters in a class it may be combined for prizes with a neighbouring class.

## 26 RISK STATEMENT

- 26.1 Rule 4 of the Racing Rules of Sailing states: “The responsibility for a boat’s decision to participate in a race or to continue racing is hers alone.”
- 26.2 Sailing is by its nature an unpredictable sport and therefore inherently involves an element of risk. By taking part in the event, each competitor agrees and acknowledges that:
- they are aware of the inherent element of risk involved in the sport and accept responsibility for the exposure of themselves, their crew and their boat to such inherent risk whilst taking part in the event;
  - they are responsible for the safety of themselves, their crew, their boat and their other property whether afloat or ashore;
  - they accept responsibility for any injury, damage or loss to the extent caused by their own actions or omission;
  - their boat is in good order, equipped to sail in the event and they are fit to participate;
  - the provision of a race management team and other officials and volunteers by the event organiser does not relieve them of their own responsibilities;
  - they are responsible for ensuring that their boat is equipped and seaworthy so as to face extremes of weather; that there is a crew sufficient in number, experience and fitness to withstand such weather; and that the safety equipment is properly maintained, stowed, in date and familiar to the crew; and

## 27 INSURANCE

- 27.1 Each participating boat shall ensure that their boat is adequately insured, against all third party claims.
